A CCJS Spring Symposium | MAY 9th - 11th 2021

The CCJS will host an invitation-only virtual symposium on May 9th - 11th to discuss themes in recent Catholic theologies of Jews and Judaism. Topics include the relation of the election of Israel to the universality of salvation in Christ, the nature and extent of the Church's mission, and the affirmation that God's covenant with the Jewish people has never been revoked, including the status of the land of Israel as an aspect of that covenant. The discussion will also include what theological dialogue is, and how it might relate to biblical studies, comparative theology, and philosophy. CCJS's Spring Symposium aims to provide a space for Catholic theologians to discuss with Jewish scholars these recent proposals, as well as methodological approaches to theological dialogue.
